Birder's Abroad

North-West Venezuela

1 - 19 April 2007

Introduction

The group consisted of 8 British birders guided by a young and enthusiastic Canadian, David Geale and Jurgen Beckers. David is an excellent guide, who has already a number of years experience in Peru, although this was his first trip to Venezuela.

Most participants had already some neotropical experience (all in Peru, some in Ecuador and Costa Rica), making things even easier.

The tour ran through the Easter Holiday period. This is also a holiday period in Venezuela (Semana Santa).

It is not the ideal period for various reasons. Organising is much more difficult, best hotels are full, even more noise in the reserves and – perhaps worse of all – no beer with the evening meals, which is now a Venezuelan law.

Besides April is not the best month for birding in Northern Venezuela. It is the beginning of the rainy season. However we were extremely lucky this year with the weather (read: no rain).

The majority of migrants had already left and most trees had finished flowering. (We only had one flowering tree for the whole trip, so the number of hummingbirds was disappointing).

April is breeding month for a lot of species and activity (especially in mixed flocks) is much lower. But some were more vocal and we managed to see a few good ones, some by playing tape, others by patience and observation.

Nevertheless we ended the trip with a good total of 511 species seen and an additional 21 heard.

This greatly thanks to the very special efforts of David. He was always active looking for the special species and trying to explain to all members where they were hiding.

We didn't go either to shore (for migrant waders), due to a car accident in Maracaibo which would have increased the species count.

Generally the trip was good, but far too much time was spent travelling and the program was a bit overloaded by squeezing a 3 week program (already overloaded) in 18 days. Most found that too much time was spend travelling.

2 - 4 April - Henri Pittier NP

Having arrived late on the 1st, our first full first day was spent at the Rancho Grande visitor centre.

Despite Semana Santa, it was relatively quiet here.

We managed to see most specialities: Guttulated Foliage-gleaner, Violet-chested Hummingbird, White-tipped Quetzal, Blood-eared Parakeet, Venezuelan Bristle-tyrant, Rufous-lored Tyrannulet, missing only on Handsome Fruiteater. But on the other hand we had Venezuelan Wood-Quail (a bonus) in return, a species not expected; we even had a few groups. Enough so that everyone had at least one good look.

The visitor centre balcony provided stunning views of many tanagers and other forest edge birds, including Red-crowned and Golden-Olive Woodpecker, Groove-billed Toucanet, Cinnamon Flycatcher, Crested Spinetail, Pale-breasted and White-necked Thrush, White-winged, Silverbeaked, Palm, Golden, Speckled. Bay-headed and Swallow Tanager.

The Choroni pass was another story. Noisy with an police post right on the top and many cars passing. A Mottled Owl called in the early morning and a few were able to see it before it flew off.

Rufous-cheeked Tanager was the one we were looking for and it was seen a few times; along with brief views of White-tipped Quetxal, and very good views of Ochre-breasted Brush-Finch.

We were also able to see all 3 Antthrushes (Black-faced, Short-tailed and Scalloped), occurring here; a first occurence for Jurgen's trips to this area.

The 3rd day we birded the lower parts of the national park. Chestnut-sided Warbler – a rare migrant – was a new one for the N-W Venezuela trip.

With the manakins (apart from Lance-tailed) we were a bit unlucky: the times we saw Wire-tailed, it were always females. (Later in the Andes we had the same problem with Golden-winged Manakins.)

6 – 9 April - Hato El Frio - Los Llanos

The Llanos was good, with a record of 160 species seen on the 2nd day in Hato El Frio.

We had clouded weather most of the time (perfect climate) and there was activity all day, and every day a Giant Anteater during daytime and on one occasion excellent views of Southern Tamandua.

We also encountered many Yellow-billed Cuckoo's and at least 6 Upland Sandpipers on their way north and an unusual find this far inland was a Tricoloured Heron.

A White-naped Xenopsaris was a very unusual find around the ranch buildings. Whilst just a short distance further was another new one for Hato El Frio: Yellow-browed Tyrant.

We had several nice trips trying to cover all habitats. One dedicated for Pale-headed Jacamar, one for Horned Screamers, an evening trip with groups of Nacunda Nighthawks flying high overhead. Another good bird was Amazonian Black-tyrant. Just one male was seen.

10 - 14 April - The Andes

Before we arrived in the Andes it had been raining every day in the Andes, but when we finally arrived here, we had 4 days of very dry weather. Perhaps even too dry weather.

But best birds were seen on this part of the tour. The highlight of the whole trip, as voted by the group, was undoubtedly **Ocellated Tapaculo**, a very secretive species which is nearly impossible to see, and which <u>everyone</u> (10/10) saw very well.

Voted in 3rd place was a male Spangled Coquete, with his crest up at Rio Frio.

Other toppers – also seen by everyone – were: 2nd, Bearded Helmetcrest (male & female), Spotted Nightingale-thrush, Amethyst Woodstar and Booted Rackettail; all closeby at eye level.

Military Macaws were common, more so than usual. We had several flying overhead and some even perched.

White-bellied Antbird and Band-tailed Guan were heard at several places but we failed on seeing them.

15 - 19 April - Maracaibo region

we experienced.

On the way north we made a few stops adding Pygmy Swifts and Black-whiskered Vireo to the list. It had been raining and the dry scrub was full of bright green leaves. Humidity was high and it felt extreme hot. Not so pleasant but the birds made it feel cooler: many White-whiskered Spinetails, a few Chestnut Piculets, Northern Scrub-Flycatchers, Slender-billed Inezia's and Maracaibo Todyflycatchers. A Black-backed Antshrike called once, but we were unable to see him.

A morning was spend in savannah. We counted 5 Northern Screamers, a couple Red-and-Green Macaws, 5 Jabiru's, but we missed the Dwarf Cuckoo.

A couple of White Hawks were circling low over the forest in the Perija foothills, and a couple of the group were very fortunate to see an Andean Lamiisoma, an extremely rare and difficult to see species.

On the last morning one of the group braved an early start and added; Buffy Hummingbird, Vermillion Cardinal, Caribbean Coot, Mangrove Warbler and Bicoloured Conebill.

All the group saw a male Ruby-throated Topaz at the very last moment in a flowering tree at the airport.

Below is a list of all species seen on the trip; hopefully I have highlighted the endemics correctly. Thanks to everyone who came along and made the trip what it was; despite some of the problems
